We started our adventure by roaming around the French Market and then renting bicycles in the French Quarter and riding over to Blaine Kerns Marde Gras World.

#### Blaine Kerns Marde Gras World

Blaine Kerns Marde Gras World offers a real behind the scenes look at how Mardi Gras floats are created. Blaine Kern Studios has been creating amazing floats for Mardi Gras

and other parades around the world since 1947. The tour gives visitors a chance to see how floats are built from the ground up. Visitors tour the actual build facility and often get to see the amazing artisans at work as they create the floats from mediums such as paper mâché, styrofoam and wood. After seeing the amazing creations at Blaine Kerns Mardi Gras World, we rode over to the Auction House Market for some lunch.





#### The Auction House Market

Located in the Warehouse District, the Auction House Market has something for everyone. This unique restaurant is a high scaled take on a food court. There is general seating that surrounds a bar and you place your order at one of several dining counters with a range of food choices. There was sushi, asian, creole, seafood, stuffed turkey legs, comfort food and even a market deli. The food was amazing and the atmosphere was fun and relaxing.



Once we had lunch, we cycled to the Algiers Ferry and rode the ferry across the mighty Mississippi River. ### Wednesday


We started the morning off with an amazing breakfast from Oceana Grill.



#### Pop Bar



#### Hornit Clug

The Hornit Clug is the world's smallest bike rack - about the size of a hockey puck. But don't let size fool you, the little Clug works like a charm and will store your bike securely. Simply screw the hard plastic Clug to the wall using the 2 included anchors, snap in your tire and you are set. The Clug comes in several color choices and 5 sizes for all types of bikes. There is also a Clug Pro which includes a FIDLOCK magnetic ratcheting safety strap or you can purchase an upgrade kit for your Clug if you want to add the strap. The stylish Clug stores your bikes neatly on the wall with their rear tire resting on the floor and is barely noticeable when not being used for storage. 

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I traveled to Leesburg, Virginia in search of a big-time gravel race, and boy, the US Endurance Gravel Grinder National Championship did not disappoint. As an older rider I am not looking for 12,000 feet of elevation gain, epic water crossing or hike a bike sections that some races boast. I like a gravel course for gravel bikes that can be raced and the one-hundred-mile Grinder Nationals fit the ticket. I found hard paced limestone roads, very low traffic, few intersections and beautiful stone fenced countryside. Check-in was seamless with the friendliest race supporters ever! Bonus points for a location, Loudoun County, that provided wonderful choices of airbnb's, wineries, breweries and restaurants for my wife and I.

The weather added a confounder to planning as the forecast was for 50° F with steady rain... and the weatherman was right. I always say there is no bad weather just bad gear, well my theory would be tested at this race. I layered a fishnet sleeveless base with a FroggTogg rain jacket that had the sleeves and collar cutoff under a lightweight wool long sleeve base. My gear continued with a heavy bike vest, a fleece cap, and full fingered gloves. Finally, I used lightweight shoe covers taped at the top to keep water from running down and bib shorts – my clothing was spot on, and my theory stayed intact.







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





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Race game - I am a diesel these days. The Race went away from me quickly which allowed me to pick my lines and settle into my rhythm - the rolling terrain was set up for my diesel style. My goal was 6 hours for the 100 miler, which would be a 16.5 mph average. I got into technical problems early as I installed the wrong computer. I mistakenly had used my Garmin 830 which is fantastic except in rain as the touch screen is unusable and mapping disappears. Fortunately for me, the course was very well marked, and marshals were plentiful. So, no computer turn by turn required, but I recovered little data including Strava so I guess I never really raced:). The even bigger issue was the effect of wet gravel on my Shimano hydraulic disc brakes. I could hear brake rub 20 miles into the race. I had this experience at the 2021 Michigan Coast to Coast, but today I really could not feel any drag. My only comfort was if I had drag/squeal, I had brakes. No squeal, no brakes. I finished this time with brakes! With the cooler wet weather, I did not stop for hydration. I carried 3 bottles and only drank 2.5 along with 2 Gu gels (My base hydration is usually 1 bottle/hr). I finished with a wet 6:34 time, off my goal pace, but won my lightly contested 65-70 class. I always like to look at the next younger age group and, in that group, I was well off the podium pace.
































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After the race we had great food and drinks at the Bluemont Station Brewery & Winery, which was the start and finish line for the race. The postrace festivities included lots of camaraderie between the riders, a big raffle for prizes and the awarding of the top 3 riders in each category - with National Champion jerseys for the winners!

The event had 2 distances to choose from, a timed 35-mile fun ride (The Mini G) and the 100-mile Grinder Nationals – something for everyone from beginner riders to the tip of the spear racers. So, when you are planning your rides or races for next year give The Mini G and Grinder Nationals some thought – you will not be disappointed!

## **Exploring the Socorro Islands**

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
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After a week of diving in the Socorro Islands, you return exhausted yet exhilarated, awed and amazed. You have met the inhabitants of the Revillagigedo Archipelago up close, in their world, and they made you feel small.

They are gigantic and wild, yet they took the time to come by and

look you in the eye. You return to your own world with a different perspective on where you belong.





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
Once you board your home for the week, store your belongings, and get settled, the world you knew begins to melt away. Not far out of Cabo, you lose phone and internet service, forcing you to turn off the electronics and rejoin the world around you. The drone of the engine, the motion of the waves, and the feel of the wind lull you into a relaxed state. This is a great time to get to know the other explorers on your journey, often from all over the world.

The second morning of the trip is the day you have been waiting for. Divers double check the gear, ready cameras and load into one of three inflatable smaller boats for their journey to the dive site. Each panga has



an experienced crew and is led by an expert dive guide when underwater. The divers sit on the edge of the boat to don their fins and their masks. When the signal comes, they roll backwards into a world that is hard to explain or predict. Socorro is a journey that will leave visitors forever changed.

One of the first dives of a trip to the Socorro Islands will be at the Canyon, off the island of San Benedicto, in the fingers of rock formed by the long-ago volcanic eruptions. Schools of Clarion Angelfish and other small fish have gathered in the area to do a very important job removing the parasites from the larger pelagic animals. The area is a huge underwater spa for 37 species of shark and ray, including Giant Pacific Manta Rays. Divers can squeeze in among the rock, and let the animals come to them. Sharks slowly glide by letting the fish do their jobs. Galapagos, silky, white tip, silver tip, and even hammerheads will visit the Canyon, usually uncaring of the divers in their midst.

While the sharks usually remain neutral to the divers, the Giant Rays seem to be curious or even friendly. Their giant form appears out the haze and glides toward the divers and their rising bubbles. After coming close enough to make eye contact, they will often allow divers to swim along below them with the rising bubbles tickling their bellies. Many of these rays are regulars to the area, identified by their belly markings, and listed in a worldwide register.





One, known as Michelle, danced and glided with divers for most of two dives, circling, swirling and looping back to swim in tandem.

Other dives will take you to Roca Partida, the parted rock. The two spires of Roca Partida rise above the waters' surface, colored white after years of nesting sea birds. Once you descend into the waters of Roca Partida, you encounter hundreds of schooling fish and white tip sharks. Each rock ledge provides a resting place for piles of white tip sharks and often large groups of spiny lobsters. They alternate resting in their piles, with slowly swimming around the rock pinnacle. In a vast area of seemingly empty ocean, this area is almost overwhelmed with life.









Suddenly a pod of dolphins appears in the distance, seeking out the companionship of the divers. The dolphins dance close to each diver, taking time to make eye contact and even posing for pictures. They have quite a reputation in the area for being sneaky while playful. Divers must be aware of their surroundings and not be pulled into going deeper with their animated playmates. As soon as they appear, the playful group disappears.

The underwater world is surprisingly noisy. Divers listen to the sound of their own Darth Vadar like breathing, the release of air bubbles, the clicks of the dolphins communicating with each other, the crunch of the parrotfish as they scrape the top layer of rock in their powerful jaws. The sounds become hypnotic and calming. Then you hear the sound that stops you in your tracks - the call of the Humpback Whale.



Whales often migrate through the waters around Socorro, stopping to rest in their migration route. Their flukes can be seen flipping above the waters, and sometimes boaters are fortunate enough to see them breach with big splashes. Divers don't often encounter them underwater. The moment you realize a 40-ton animal is nearby is one you will never forget.

As our group of divers swam around Roca Partida, the whales came into view. We were in the presence of a mother and baby humpback whale, and their escort whale. The moment is frozen in time, the calm of the mother, the playfulness of the baby, and the watchful eye of the escort. The whales were not in any hurry and stayed with our group all day.

The mother floated with her eyes half closed, yet always aware of the location of her offspring. The one-ton infant would leave the protective position under mama's chin and venture to the surface for a breath of air. It would then return to the mother and once again snuggle under her chin, protected by the large pectoral fins. Not far behind this pair was the watchful escort. This whale was very aware of all the activity of the divers in the area and let us know if we got too close. At one point, the 40-ton escort swam to the surface and breached, making what felt like a sonic boom travel through the water that could be felt in our chests. The rules were stated and enforced with this one move.

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

Hyskore has been known for their quality compression dampened rifle and shooting rests for years. Using their functional approach, Hyskore has recently expanded their target stand offerings to provide some unique stands that are heavy duty, stable and quick to assemble. The collection ranges from extreme long range stands to simple T-post stands that are perfect for improving your accuracy at your home range.

### Extreme Range Target Hound

The Hyskore Extreme Range Target Hound (30320) gives you the capability of having a large, stable and portable long-range target. That's right, I said portable. You can set up this large target stand in a couple of minutes!


Simply attach 1-inch EMT legs and cross bar and 1 x 2 or 2 x 4 uprights to the bracket and your Extreme Range Target Hound is ready for use. The sockets for the 1 x 2 and 2 x 4 are oversized to accommodate rough cut lumber and have holes so you can secure the lumber with screws. The Extreme Range Target Hound can be used as a traditional target stand or a hanging gong stand. The two brackets can be adjusted to just about any size target by varying the length of the EMT crossbar, making this an infinitely flexible target stand.





### Long Range Target Hound

The Hyskore Long Range Target Hound (30310) is an adjustable target stand that is great for long distance shooting. The stand can be adjusted from 24 to 47 inches wide in 1-inch increments to support a variety of targets. The stand features oversized 8 inch deep sockets for both 1 x 2 or 2 x 4 uprights. The Long Range Target Hound legs are made from powder coated, heavy duty welded 3mm steel and are 24 inches long. The legs have holes to attach 2 x 4 stringers to increase the footprint and can be used to stake the stand to the ground as well. The Long Range Target Hound can be set up to hold one large long range target or multiple shorter range targets



### Target Hound

The Hyskore Target Hound (30291) is a tough, light weight target stand designed for 18 inch targets. The welded steel stand has sockets for both 1 x 2 or 2 x 4 uprights and is quickly assembled by attaching 4 bolts. The stands legs have predrilled holes for attaching 2 x 4 stringers or staking the stand to the ground. The Target Hound is an affordable solution to setting up multiple targets in your home range.





### Range Hound

The Hyskore Range Hound (30303) are part of Hyskores T-post target system and provides a quick and simple method to hang targets. The brackets are heat treated chrome molly steel that is the same material and process used for the turrets of Sherman tanks. The cast brackets do not suffer annealing (hardness degradation) due to the Heat Affected Zone (HAZ) created by plasma or oxy-acetylene cutting which is common for many other AR500 fixtures. The system is designed to use T-posts for the legs and crossbar, but is also compatible with ½ or ¾ inch rebar and ½ or ¾ inch EMT. The 20-degree

angled brackets feature both semicircular cleats and drilled and tapped notches for hanging chain. The brackets also feature drilled and tapped holes for securing the T-post legs. The Range Hound (30303) is easy to set up and easy to repair if a T-post is damaged during use.



### Range Hound

The Hyskore Range Hound (30305) is an accessory that works perfectly with the 30303 for hanging gongs. The heat-treated chrome molly steel Range Hound 30305 slides on to the horizontal T-post and provides both semicircular cleats and drilled and tapped notches for hanging chain. The bracket also features drilled and tapped holes to prevent the bracket from sliding on the horizontal T-post. AW

### Nomad Harvester NXT Jacket

Hunters can choose a two hog meat hunt or a trophy hog hunt depending upon their goals. At Hog Wild, hunters have bagged many hogs over 400 pounds and they harvest over 600 hogs annually from the ranch.
